

Solar Water Heating



- Average \$600/year savings
- •\$1000 rebate
- Hawai'i and federal tax credits
- Special loans

Alternative Water Heating



- Energy Star heat pump
- 1-2 people in household
- •\$300 rebate (Hawaii Energy)



Appliances



- Double check requirements
- Buy from participating stores
- Energy Star appliances operate more efficiently



Kaua'i Rebates



Kaua'i Island Utility Cooperative (KIUC) \$50 Rebates

- Clothes washers
- Refrigerators
- Freezers

Hawaii Energy Rebates



- \$50 for Refrigerators
- \$100 Refrigerator Trade-Up
- Refrigerator/Freezer"Rid-A-Fridge" bounty program
- •\$50 Energy Star A/C trade-up
- •\$50 Solar attic fans
- •\$35 Energy Star ceiling fans

Hawai'i Gas Rebates



- •\$100 Single new gas appliance
- •\$100 new customer referrals

- ·Save \$0.95 on CFLs
- Save \$3-\$5 on LEDs

Energy Monitors Use



- How much energy am I using?
- Plug-in models
- In-home displays
- Determine what can be unplugged



Smart Plugs Use



- Control your electrical outlet from your smart phone or computer
- Some also include timer and energy monitor
 features



Timers Use

 Cut power to devices when they are not needed automatically



Hot Water Tips



Minimize Hot Water Use

- Wash clothes with cold water
- Use low-flow shower heads
- •Flow rate of 2.5 gallons per minute (gpm) or less

Hot Water Heater Tips



- Set the thermostat to 120°F
- Insulate it
- Safety first



Residual Heat Tips



- Dry consecutive laundry loads
- Turn off the oven 15 minutes early, but leave in oven for 5 more minutes
- Reduce temperature by 25°
 when using glass
 baking dishes

More Residual Heat Tips



- Cover pots and pans
- Match burner and pot sizes
- Toaster and microwave ovens
 use less energy than a stove



Computer Use Tips



- Enable energy saving features
- Dim display when possible
- Use sleep mode or shut down
- Remember to shut off other computer equipment powered separately
- · Monitor, speakers, printer, etc.

Types of Computer Use Tips

- Laptop computers use less energy than desktops
- Tablets use even less




TV Energy Tips



- LED TVs consume less energy
- Check for energy saving mode







Phantom Loads



- Electronic devices may still draw power even when "off" but plugged in
- Chargers, TVs, DVRs, etc.
- Unplug or turn off power strips

Home Cooling



- Block out sunlight
- Avoid placing hot objects near your A/C's thermostat
- Lower A/C temperature and run it in combination with a fan
