## Cenchrus echinatus

## Common sandbur

Cenchrus echinatus L.

Family: Poaceae

**Description:** Annual bunchgrass to 2 ft tall, profusely branched, stems (culms) flat, decumbent at base, smooth or rough. Sheaths to 3 inches long, smooth or rough with whitish collar, compressed. Ligules densely hairy. Blades to 3.5 inch long, upper surface rough. Inflorescences upright; develops burs at flowering stem terminals that readily detach and adhere to clothing, fur, and feathers<sup>(70)</sup>. *Echinatus*, armed with spines, a reference to the burs<sup>(69)</sup>.

**Distribution:** From tropical America, now widely distributed throughout the temperate and tropic zones. Infests dry areas on all the main islands and the Northwestern Islands. First collected on O'ahu in 1867<sup>(70)</sup>.

**Environmental impact:** Infests dry areas especially along leeward coastal areas. Burs a nuisance for people and dangerous for hatchlings of seabirds on the Northwestern Islands.



**Management:** Sensitive to glyphosate. However, seed reservoir in soil suggests a preemergence herbicide would be helpful in nesting areas.
